Entering a Quilt in the 2018 WAQG Quilt Show

Entry forms for the 2018 WAQG quilt show will be available starting in October. We will have both electronic and paper copies. All forms are due at or before the January meeting. Please only turn in a form if you are confident that your quilt will be completed by the February meeting. Those quilts that are not completed by the February meeting will be removed from the show. We need to have an accurate count of quilt entries to plan the display layout for the show.

As in past shows, you can choose whether or not you would like to have your quilt judged. While being "judged" may sound intimidating, it is a great way to get constructive feedback from an expert quilter.

The entry form will ask for detailed information about your quilt that will assist us in putting it into the appropriate category. The categories will be determined by the types of entries we have, with the goal being to have an even distribution of the number of entries across categories. Be thinking about good names for your entries!

We will also have two special categories, neither of which will be judged:

The Starting Line - Entries of "first time" quilts, which could be your very first quilt show entry ever, or pieces that represent an new type of quilt for you even if you have participated in shows before. For example, if in the past you have always shown quilts with computerized long-arm quilting, but this time you have a quilt where you tried free-motion domestic-machine quilting for the first time, that might be an appropriate "Starting Line" entry. If you want your first time entry to compete in the general show you will need to enter it as a standard item.

Guild Challenges (2016 and 2017) - If you have completed a challenge for 2016 (Essence of Alabama) or will have one for 2017 (Flying Geese) these will be displayed together in a special area. We encourage you all to share your challenge item for this display (even if it wasn't ready for the December Challenge show!). It a great way to demonstrate the community our guild represents. If you want your challenge item to compete in the general show you will need to enter it as a standard item. If you have any questions speak to Laura R.

Charlotte shared a recent article from The Quilting Company that I think you will find fascinating. It reported the results from the Quilting in America 2017 Survey and it shows the following interesting facts about quilting.

The Size of U.S. Quilting Market

- Total number of quilters 7 to 10 million in the U.S.
- Total number of quilting households is 6 to 8.3 million
- The estimated total annual spending is \$3.7 billion
- Quilting household spends an average of \$442 annually

All Quilters	Beginner	Intermediate	Advanced

Dedicated Quilters

- Defined as those households who spend more than \$500 per year on quilting-related purchases
- They represent 16.4% of all quilting households

Who is the Dedicated Quilter?

- A 63 years old female who has been quilting 19 years
- She is well educated (70% attended college)
- Affluent with an average household income of \$95,900
- Spends on average \$3,363 per year on quilting
- Leans toward a preference of traditional quilting styles (85%) over modern (37%) and art (20%)
- In past 12 months purchased an average of 99 yards of fabric at an average cost of \$9.34 per yard
- 64% turned to quilting-related websites and 52% to online classes and videos for inspiration
- Spend 7.9 hours weekly on the internet browsing, visiting or interacting with quilting-related sites

Buying Habits

- The Dedicated Quilter purchases an average of 99 yards of fabric with the average price per yard of \$9.34
- Favorite fabric types: Batiks (72%); Small Floral Prints (65%); Holiday Prints (64%); Print Solids/Blenders, etc. (64%); and Tone-on-Tone Neutrals (58%)
- 83% will purchase 100% cotton thread
- Over half purchase batting in the queen form while 43% purchase in rolls with 66% are most likely to have purchased natural cotton and 55% cotton/poly blend
- 97% are purchasing fabric, batting and/or thread in person at retail locations and 68% are purchasing items online

The Under 45 Quilter

- Educated (4-year college graduate 35%; Post graduate degree 23%)
- Affluent (\$98,000 average household income)
- Devote on average 10 hours a week quilting
- Twice as likely to be employed full-time while devoting this time to her craft
- 26% have purchased a traditional sewing machine and 26% attended a quilt show in the past year
- Prefers modern quilting
- Websites (75%) and online video (63%) play a stronger role for information and inspiration
- Facebook, Instagram and Pinterest are important sources for this group
